


Rob David





In May 1937 nearly 4000 children from the Basque region of Spain came as refugees to Britain fleeing the Spanish Civil War. Over 100 came to Cumbria and were accommodated in 'colonies' in Ambleside, Brampton, Carlisle and Wigton. In the last few years a significant number of documents associated with the Brampton and Ambleside homes have been deposited at Cumbria Archive Centre in Carlisle and these have allowed the story of the Basque children in Cumbria and the county's response to these refugees to be written. This new history reveals that in the 1930s, as now, the people of Cumbria welcomed refugees into their communities and provided sustained financial support which allowed the homes to remain open.

Dr Rob David has been studying, writing about, and lecturing on the experience of refugees in Cumbria for a number of years. He has previously written A County of Refuge: Refugees in Cumbria 1933-1941 (Kendal, 2020). He was President of the Cumberland and Westmorland Antiquarian and Archaeological Society from 2017 to 2020.
